Adverb

An adverb is a word that changes or talks about a verb, an adjective, or another adverb. It tells us more about how, when, where, or how much something happens or exists.

Examples of Adverbs:

- She sings beautifully.
- He spoke softly.
- The dog jumped high.
- She runs fast.
- The bus stopped suddenly.

Types of Adverbs

Types	Adverbs	Examples
1: Adverb of Time	Now, Soon, Yesterday, today	She will start his new job soon.
2: Adverb of Place	here, there, everywhere	She placed the book here on the table.
3: Adverb of Manner	quickly, softly, carefully	He ran <u>quickly</u> to catch the bus.
4: Adverb of Frequency	rarely, never, usually	They <u>never</u> miss their favorite TV show.
5: Adverb of Degree	very, too, quite	The weather is quite hot today.
6: Adverb of Reason	because, so, thus	She ate an apple because she was hungry.
7: Interrogative Adverb	Why, where, how	Why did she leave early?

Adverbs of Time:

These adverbs show us when something happens.

eventually, immediately, eventually, suddenly, now, soon, yesterday, today, tomorrow, always, often.

Examples Sentences:

- She will start his new job soon.
- He will meet you tomorrow at the park.
- He arrived late for the meeting.
- She finished the race last.

Adverbs of Place:

These adverbs tell us where something happens.

here, there, everywhere.

Examples Sentences:

- She placed the book here on the table.
- The birds flew there to build their nests.
- The boy searched everywhere for their lost toy.



Adverbs of Degree:

These adverbs tell us how much or how strong an action is.

very, too, quite, really, extremely, fairly, almost, nearly, absolutely, utterly, completely.

Examples Sentences:

- She was very excited about her birthday party.
- He's extremely talented at playing the guitar.
- The weather is quite hot today.
- I'm completely done with my homework.

Adverbs of Reason:

These adverbs tell us why something happened or why someone did something.

therefore, because, so, thus, hence, accordingly, consequently, as a result, since, due to, for this reason.

Examples Sentences:

- She ate an apple because she was hungry.
- He ran quickly to escape the rain.
- They studied diligently in order to pass the exam.



Adverbs of Manner:

These adverbs tell us how something is done.

quickly, softly, carefully, loudly, happily, well, badly, slowly, excitedly.

Examples Sentences:

- She drove carefully on the icy road.
- He ran quickly to catch the bus.
- They laughed loudly at the funny joke.
- The chef cooked the meal deliciously.
- They danced gracefully on the stage.

Adverbs of Frequency:

These adverbs tell us how many times something happens. always, often, sometimes, rarely, never, usually, occasionally.

Examples Sentences:

- I always eat breakfast before school.
- They rarely go to the movies on weekdays.
- He usually visits his grandparents on Sundays.
- She often practices playing the piano.
